Scavenger Hunt

Go for a walk and collect small items in a bag or a bucket. When you get home, can you sort them into categories? Can you catalogue your collection by drawing and labelling the items? Can you arrange them by size?

Sound Stroll

that you hear. Can you recreate the sounds for somebody to guess what they were? Make it a competition between you and your walking partner — who can hear the most?!

Obstacle Course

Can you create an obstacle course in your garden or local park? Some ideas for different parts could be egg and spoon, skipping, dribbling round markers (such as stones!) What else could you include?

Tree Rubbings

Using paper and crayons on their sides, can you make rubbings from the bank of different trees? Can you tell what kind of tree it was from looking at the rubbing? What other surfaces could you make rubbings from?

Creature Hunt

Go for a walk and write down all the sounds How many living creatures can you find in your garden or local park? You could create your own catalogue of creatures by drawing and naming all the animals or insects that you find!

Make a Gamel

Can you design your own outdoor game for you and your friend or family to play? You could base this on a game you already know, like 'tig' or it could be a brand new game! Explain the rules and enjoy!

Outdoor Art

Can you create a collage from natural materials you find outside, such as grass, stones or twigs? You could create your own outdoor art gallery and invite your family or friends to view your exhibition!

Knots and Crosses

Make a giant knots and crosses board on the ground using chalk or sticks. You could collect different outdoor objects to use as Knots and crosses, like stones, leaves or sticks. What else could you use?!

Mud Pie

Can you make your own potion or mud pie by using 'ingredients' from around your garden or local park? You could even write a recipe and host a cooking show for family or friends! But don't let anybody eat it please!
